

## Houses of Hope Completed in Remote Babay for Two Families



RyKarline with partner and two children lived in a tent in Babay 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  years after earthquake.

To qualify for a House of Hope, RyKarline and RoseMala completed four classes, participated in a one-day community project and contributed a bag of cement towards their future home. Participation in the project is important!



After digging the foundation, the families carry materials on their heads, using a donkey and a horse.



These three girls all carried roofing sheets the half-mile distance from where the contractor delivered materials.



The contractor's crew works on the foundation, with vistas on Baby hill country in the background.



The families continue to stay involved by providing water to mix the concrete. This requires a good downhill walk to the river and back.



A hike through the hills accesses building sites. Families must carry all building materials by hand to their home sites.



The contractor's crews are often assisted by visiting teams to install roofs.



Community leaders, Joseph and Badin from Sous Savanne, work with the families to paint the homes



Each house is dedicated with prayer, presentation of a Creole Bible and keys to the new home. RyKarline, RoseMala and their families worked hard and diligently for several months toward fulfilling their dream of having a "House of Hope".
